1. Engagement of All Pupils in Regular Physical Activity

Spending: £9,016

- Although installed in the final weeks of the academic year, the Active Wall has already generated excitement among pupils and staff. Trials with small groups demonstrated high engagement, especially from pupils who are typically less active.
- Playground markings have provided clear zones for skipping, running games, and ball skills. Midday supervisors report improved pupil behaviour and engagement outdoors.
- Additional PE equipment supported more inclusive sessions, allowing for smaller group sizes and improved participation.
- Next Steps (2025–26): Launch Active Wall in Autumn Term 2025, integrate it across subjects, and provide CPD for lunchtime staff.

2. The Profile of PE and Sport is Raised Across the School

- Sporting achievements are recognised during 'Sports Celebration Monday' assemblies and in newsletters.
- The school environment now showcases PE visibly through playground resources and new installations.
- Pupils express pride in their sports involvement, and teachers embed movement in cross-curricular lessons.
- Next Steps (2025–26): Create a Sports Council, launch inter-house leaderboards, and link Active Wall with academic challenges.

3. Increased Confidence, Knowledge, and Skills of Staff in Teaching PE

Spending: £10,755

- Staff now feel significantly more confident planning and delivering PE sessions. They better understand skill progression and differentiation.
- Synergy coaches provided ongoing feedback, helping refine pedagogy. Staff surveys showed improved confidence in delivering fundamental movement skills.
- Next Steps (2025–26): Continue Synergy support, introduce peer mentoring, and provide CPD on assessment in PE.

4. Broader Experience of a Range of Sports and Activities

Spending: Embedded in previous indicators

- Pupils accessed a wider variety of sports, which boosted enjoyment and skill development.
- Teachers used Complete PE to structure planning. Pupils expressed interest in new sports like cricket and gymnastics.
- Next Steps (2025–26): Add new sports based on pupil voice, host themed weeks, and invite local clubs for taster sessions.

5. Increased Participation in Competitive Sport

Spending: £600

- Heighington pupils participated in local competitions and achieved success in all events entered.
- Parents and pupils reported improved confidence, teamwork, and school pride. Internal house competitions increased inclusive competition.
- Next Steps (2025–26): Expand events to younger pupils, host more intra-school competitions, and set up regular training sessions.

Swimming Attainment – Year 6 (2024–25)

Cohort Size: 30 pupils

- 90% can swim 25m competently, confidently, and proficiently
- 90% can use a range of strokes effectively
- 90% can perform safe self-rescue in water-based situations

- The installation of the Active Wall in the summer term has laid the foundation for a more interactive and engaging PE offer starting in Autumn 2025.
- All allocated Sports Premium funding has been fully spent within the academic year, with no carry forward.
- This year's investment in infrastructure, staff development, and enrichment has built a platform for long-term sustainable impact.
